
Pixar Film Festival: Toy Story (G - 81 min)



Best-Selling Author Robin Cook, MD, returns on September 9 at 7:30 PM

Robin Cook will discuss his new novel *Foreign Body*, set in India and the United States. Widely credited with introducing the word "medical" to the thriller genre with his first novel, *Coma*, Robin



Cook will talk about medical tourism, the theme of this novel, and about his work and life including the prequel to *Foreign Body* produced on the web by Michael Eisner. *Foreign Body* is his 28th national bestseller; he has been translated into 40 languages and has sold more than one hundred million copies. This year's event will conclude with book signing.

Music, Movement and Me with Sara Epstein



Author Lawrence Cobin - Anna's Shtetl Anna Spector was born in 1905 in Korsun, a Ukrainian town on the Ros River, eighty miles south of Kiev. Korsun and its fluid ethnic population were characteristic of the Pale of Settlement in Eastern Europe:

comprised of Ukrainians, Cossacks, Jews and other groups living uneasily together in relationships punctuated by violence. Anna left in 1919, having lived through the Great War, the Bolshevik Revolution, and part of the ensuing civil war, as well as several episodes of more or less organized pogroms—deadly anti-Jewish riots begun by various invading military detachments during the Russian Civil War and joined by some of Korsun's peasants. Her rare account, the product of some 300 interviews, is valuable because most personal memoirs of ghetto life are written by men. Although the Jewish communities in Eastern Europe are now virtually gone, less than 100 years ago they counted a population of millions. Come and hear about this dark period of history - the book will be available for sale and autographing following the presentation.

Monday, September 29th 7:00 PM Needham Author Samuel L. Blumenfeld -

The Marlowe-Shakespeare Connection: A New Study of the Authorship Question

This book addresses the long-standing debate over the

Shakespeare authorship problem and offers a daring solution: that
the true author of the works attributed to Shakespeare was in fact
poet and playwright Christopher Marlowe. Citing substantial and
compelling evidence, Mr. Blumenfeld outlines several hypotheses
to support his case, including the theory that several top people in
Queen Elizabeth's government were involved in the plot to save
Marlowe (who was reportedly a spy in the Secret Service.) The book
will be available for purchase and autographing following the
presentation.
