
Trustee Pick of the Month



This month's Trustee recommendation comes from Rick Hardy who recommends two books on the subject of information: the first deals with the development of information and information theory, and the other the future

of its distribution and control. Together they bring to the forefront how critical information is, in both its form and its means of access to a modern society.

The Information: A History, a Theory, a Flood by James Gleick presents a sprawling history of information—its development and many of the scientists who deciphered the physical principles of information theory.



Gleick touches upon the history of information from African tribal communication with drums, through the development of the alphabet, cuneiform writing, the telegraph, telephone to modern computers. This expansive book reveals how information and its technology created our modern world.



The Master Switch: The Rise and Fall of Information Empires by Tim Wu is authored by the academic who originally coined the term "net neutrality." It provides the business history of the development of informa-

tion companies as a prologue to the future of the internet. The implications of the past history of information empires, telephony, film, radio, etc. constitute a "cycle" as Wu describes: a freewheeling beginning with eventual consolidation and monopolization. The implications for today are serious to consider with the role the Internet now plays in providing the average citizen with information and as the government and information companies wrestle for control over the information highway. Much of this debate is occurring as we speak in Washington with little notice. A good read for someone interested in business history and an important book if you are concerned about the future of a democracy and how information will be controlled and distributed in the future.

John Paul Jones: A Talk by Bob Begin Thurs., September 22nd 7:30 PM



Bob Begin (U.S.S. Quincy - Feb. 2008) returns, this time telling the story of John Paul Jones, from his origins in Scotland, and his naval career that culminates with his victory against the Royal Navy, to his final days in Paris....

Begin discusses Jones' strengths and flaws, schemes and well thought out plans, as well as his unbridled ambition to always better his standings. But what also needs to be told is the story of his unabashed courage and ferocity in dealing with the enemy. Jones' actions and demeanor dwarfed those of his contemporaries. His request for a ship leaves no doubt as to his intentions when he said: "Give me a fast ship, for I intend to go in harm's way." Bob will tell this story, capturing both John Paul Jones' strengths and shortcomings, along with his significant contributions to the cause of the American Revolution.

Children's Movie: Rio - Rated PG - 96 min Fri., September 23rd 3:30 PM

A classic tale of self-discovery, romance, and adventure, Rio is the story of Blu, a flightless macaw who was taken from the forests of Rio de Janeiro as a young bird and raised by a kind girl in a small Minnesota town. When an ornithologist comes to town and informs Blu's now-grown owner Linda that Blu is the last male of his species, Blu



and Linda return to Rio so that Blu can mate with a feisty female named Jewel. Thus begins an adventure in which Blu encounters everything from the complexities of courtship and love, to thugs involved in an exotic animal theft ring, strange new friendships--including one with an overly friendly slobbering bulldog--and a crazy ride through a Carnaval parade. Blu and Linda both mature as a result of their journey in Rio, and love ensures that life will never be quite the same for either ever again.
