

NPL Book Group Tuesday, February 9th Marco Polo: From Venice to Xanadu by Laurence Bergreen


As the first European to travel extensively throughout Asia, Marco Polo was the earliest bridge between East and



West. His famous journeys took him across the boundaries of the known world, along the dangerous Silk Road, and into the court of Kublai Kahn, where he won the trust of the most feared and reviled leader of his day. Polo introduced the cultural riches of China to Europe, spawning centuries of Western fascination with Asia.

NPL Evening Book Group Wednesday, February 24th Notes of a Native Son by James A. Baldwin

James Baldwin's collection of essays, Notes of a Native Son, with the individual essays having been originally written during the 1940s and 1950s, gives readers a thoughtful commen-



tary on the social environment in the United States in the era of the Civil Rights Movement. Through the eyes and mind of one of America's most effective essayists, the conditions of being an African American living in a society that is grappling with the consequences of racial discrimination are witnessed firsthand. The subjects of his essays vary as Baldwin ponders his own reactions to the significance of the so-called protest novel to the circumstances that led many African-American writers of his time to become expatriates.

Linda Barnes is the author of 16 mystery novels, including 12 *Carlotta Carlyle* mysteries set in Boston. Her Boston and her characters deal with daily questions of good and evil. Her 6'1" redheaded Boston private eye con-

fronts crime on a daily basis and manages to keep a moral center in spite of her brushes with evil.

Barnes won the Anthony Award and nominations for both the Shamus Award and the American Mystery Award for Best Short Story for Lucky Penny in 1985. In 1987 she received the American Mystery Award for Best Private Eye Novel and nominations for the Edgar, Anthony, and Shamus awards for A Trouble of Fools.
