





Roman Fever and other stories by Edith Wharton

In addition to her Pulitzer Prize-winning talent as a novel writer, Edith Wharton also distinguished herself as a short story writer, publishing more




than seventy-two stories in ten volumes during her lifetime. The best of her short fiction is collected here in "Roman Fever and Other Stories." From her picture of erotic love and illegitimacy in the title story to her exploration of the aftermath of divorce detailed in "Souls Belated" and "The Last Asset,"

Wharton shows her usual skill "in dissecting the elements of emotional subtleties, moral ambiguities, and the implications of social restrictions," as Cynthia Griffin Wolff writes in her introduction. "Roman Fever and Other Stories" is a surprisingly contemporary volume of stories by one of our most enduring writers.

NPL Evening Book Group Wednesday, January 20th Crime and Punishment by Fyodor Dostoyevsky

Crime and Punishment focuses on the mental anguish and moral dilemmas of Rodion Romanovich Raskolnikov, an



impoverished man who formulates and executes a plan to kill an unscrupulous pawn-broker seemingly for her money, thereby solving his financial problems and at the same time, ridding the world of an evil parasite. Raskolnikov also strives to be an extraordinary being, believing that murder is permissible in pursuit of a higher purpose. Crime and Punishment is considered by many as the first of Dostoevsky's cycle of great novels, which would culminate with his last completed work, "The Brothers Karamazov," shortly before his death.

Reading Into the Future: Books, Libraries and Electronic Content Delivery

Saturday, January 23rd 2:00 PM



What will the library of the future look like? Will everyone be reading on electronic devices, rather than

reading books or magazines? Will the reference department be replaced by multiple online databases? What will our beloved Needham Free Public Library look like in 5, 10, or 20 years?

The Needham Free Public Library's Strategic Planning Committee invites you to "Reading into the Future: Books, Libraries and Electronic Content Delivery." At this January 23rd panel discussion, you will learn how libraries have already adopted these new technologies and ways to deliver content successfully. You will hear the lessons learned by academic libraries that have made the transition of their reference and serials/periodicals collections to electronic versions only. You will also learn how public libraries are managing this transition and the role the library will continue to have in the community.

A question and answer period will follow the presentation. Members of the audience will be asked to anonymously complete a brief questionnaire expressing their interest in electronic content delivery at the Needham Library. The Strategic Planning Committee will use this feedback, as it deliberates the library's course of action for the next several years.

Speakers will include experts in both academic and public libraries: Library Consultant Nancy Rae, formerly Assistant Director to the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners; Amira Aaron, academic librarian and library consultant; and Susan McAlister, Executive Director of the Minuteman Library Network, which includes Needham and thirty-four other public and seven college libraries in the Metrowest region.



cilities are safe for the 35,000 annual patients, one million outpatient visits, and 23, 000 staff while allowing thousands of people to visit the hospital each day.
