



Children's Movie: Disney's The Princess and the Frog (G - 98min.)

The Princess and the Frog moves the classic fairy tale to a snazzy version of 1920's New Orleans. Tiana is not a princess, but a young woman who hopes to fulfill her father's dream of opening a restaurant to serve food that will bring together people from all walks of life.

Tiana may wish upon a star, but she believes that hard work is the way to fulfill your aspirations. Her dedication clashes with the cheerful idleness of the visiting prince Naveen. A voodoo spell cast by Dr. Facilier, in a showstopping number by composer Randy Newman initiates the events that will bring the mismatched hero and heroine together. However, the animation of three supporting characters-Louis, a jazz-playing alligator; Ray, a Cajun firefly; and 197-year-old voodoo priestess Mama Odie--is so outstanding, it nearly steals the film.

stuck with the club through an intra-squad game before the paying public a month later. The result is a literary masterpiece about professional football that not only elevated the art of participatory journalism to an art form, but also remains one of the most insightful and hilarious books ever written on the game. The Detroit Lions agreed to permit Plimpton - wearing Number 0 - to join them for four weeks of training camp, and to culminate his apprenticeship by calling a series of plays in an intra-squad game in Pontiac Stadium. No holds are barred in this memorable, on-the-field look at football and how the professionals play it.
