





The Reluctant Fundamentalist by Mohsin Hamid

At a café table in Lahore, a bearded Pakistani man converses with an uneasy American stranger. As dusk deepens to night, he begins the tale that has brought them to this fateful meeting



Changez is living an immigrant's dream of America. At the top of his class at Princeton, he is snapped up by the elite "valuation" firm of Underwood Samson. He thrives on the energy of New York, and his infatuation with elegant, beautiful Erica promises entry into Manhattan society at the same exalted level once occupied by his own family back in Lahore. But in the wake of September 11, Changez finds his position in his adopted city suddenly overturned, and his budding relationship with Erica eclipsed by the reawakened ghosts of her past. The Genius of Birds by Jennifer Ackerman

In **The Genius of Birds**, acclaimed author Jennifer Ackerman explores the newly discovered brilliance of birds. As she travels around the world to the most cutting-edge frontiers of research—the distant labo-

2018 McIver Lecture Series— The Beanpot Connection

Dr. James Bird, Boston University: Fluid Dynamics (a.k.a. Bubbles!)

Sun., June 10th 2:00 PM



Continuing the theme of the "Beanpot Connection," **Dr. James Bird**, Asst. Professor, College of Engineering will discuss his current research interests in fluid dynamics with a specific focus on the capillary dynam-

ics of drops and bubbles. Combining both experiments and theory, he investigates problems such as how drops spread on surfaces and how bubbles pop. His research is motivated by problems in a variety of fields, including healthcare (e.g. virus transfer via droplets), energy (e.g. boiling and condensation), and materials (e.g. foams). This is the third of four lectures and is sponsored by the Trustees of the Needham Free Public Library in memory of former director Vivian D. McIver.



One Book, One Community Read

After the success of last year's One Book, One Community Read, the Trustees of the Needham Free Public Library, as part of their Diversity Initiative, are pleased to announce this year's title: *Life, Animated: A Story of Sidekicks, Heroes, and Autism* by local author Ron Suskind.



Imagine being trapped inside a Disney movie and having to learn about life mostly from animated characters dancing across a screen of color. "A fantasy? A nightmare?" This is the real-life story of Owen Suskind, the son of the Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Ron Suskind and his

wife, Cornelia. An autistic boy who couldn't speak for years, Owen memorized dozens of Disney movies, turned them into a language to express love and loss, kinship, brotherhood. The family was forced to become animated characters, communicating with him in Disney dialogue and song; until they all emerge, together, revealing how, in darkness, we all literally need stories to survive.

Autism, now affects an astonishing one in every one hundred children. While America's two million autistic people are just as diverse as the wider population, many possess a subtle weave of gifts and challenges that, year by year, are revealing underlying—and often unrecognized—capacities of the human mind.

The Library will once again provide copies of the book for you to take (and return for the next person), starting in late May and will again host a series of Book Discussions in September 2018, along with other programs relating to this years' topic.
