

Needham Author Hannah Orenstein-Playing with Matches 2:00 PM

The Needham Free Public Library presents author and Needham native Hannah Orenstein, who will be discussing her new book Playing with Matches and the evolution of dating in the age of online matchmaking services. The presentation will be moderated by Meredith Goldstein, a reporter for the Boston Globe



and columnist for the Love Letters column on Boston.com. Sasha Goldberg has a lot going for her: a recent journalism degree from NYU, an apartment with her best friend Caroline, and a relationship that would be amazing if her finance-bro boyfriend Jonathan would ever look up from his BlackBerry. But when her dream career falls through, she uses her family's darkest secret to land a job as a matchmaker for New York City's elite at the dating service Bliss. Despite her inexperience, Sasha throws herself into her new career, trolling for catches on Tinder, coaching her clients through rejection, and dishing out dating advice to people twice her age. Sasha hopes to find her clients The One, like she did. But when Jonathan betrays her, she spirals out of control--and right into the arms of a writer with a charming Southern drawl, who she had previously set up with one of her clients. He's strictly off-limits, but with her relationship on the rocks, all bets are off. Fresh, sweet, and laugh-out-loud funny, Playing with Matches is the addictive story about dating in today's swipe-heavy society, and a young woman trying to find her own place in the world.



Hannah Orenstein is the dating editor at Elite Daily and the author of Playing with Matches (2018). Previously, she was the assistant features editor at Seventeen.com. At 21, she became the

youngest matchmaker at a top dating service. She's also written for the Washington Post, Cosmopolitan, Marie Claire, Refinery29, BuzzFeed, and Bustle. Her work has been featured in the Boston Globe, the New York Post, Us Weekly, USA Today, Hello Giggles, PopSugar, and Spire & Co.

Streaming Video

The popular on-demand film streaming service Kanopy is now available for free at the Needham Free Public Library. Library card holders can access Kanopy and sign

up to start streaming films instantly by visiting https://need-hamma.kanopy.com/. Films can be streamed from any computer, television, mobile device or platform by downloading the Kanopy app for iOS, Android, AppleTV, Chromecast or Roku.

Offering what the New York Times calls "a garden of cinematic delights," Kanopy showcases more than 30,000 of the world's best films, including award-winning documentaries, rare and hard-to-find titles, film festival favorites, indie and classic films, and world cinema with collections from Kino Lorber, Music Box Films, Samuel Goldwyn, The Orchard, The Great Courses, PBS and thousands of independent filmmakers.

The Kanopy collection includes many film types: indie hits like *Hunt For the Wilderpeople* and 2 *Days in Paris*; classic masterpieces like *Aguirre, the Wrath of God* and *Seven Samurai*; and award-winning documentaries like the 2017 Oscar*-nominated *I Am Not Your Negro* and Sundance Film Festival winner *Mother of George*.

Kanopy for Kids provides films for children aged preschool and up. Parents can trust a curated selection of educational and enriching videos on Kanopy Kids with developmentally appropri-



ate, age-based ratings from Common Sense Media, as well as additional parental controls to keep kids safe.
