





AWEsomeness in the Children's Room



The Needham Free Public Library's Children's Department is more AWEsome now, with the addition of two "AWE Early Literacy" stations, donated by the Friends of the Needham Free Public Library.

AWE, or alternative working environments as the company was called early in the 1990s, produces the AWE Early Literacy station which is a self-contained, stand-alone computer with over 50 carefully selected preloaded fun and educational programs for children aged 2-8.

The colorful touch screen is combined with a mouse and key-board designed for little hands and requires no Internet access. This is one great kids' computer for the youngest library users. Additionally, non-English language learners can also benefit from this system.

The AWE Early Literacy Station's educational software covers seven curricular areas: reading, math, science, social studies, writing, arts and music, and reference. Many of the software programs contain "disguised" learning activities that expand the child's experience through games and extension activities.

The system is designed to support school readiness and technology access while making learning exciting and engaging. By expanding the library's Early Literacy services through technology, the Children's Room strengthens its commitment to help prepare children for kindergarten and beyond.

Children may access the station for 20 minute increments and may add additional sessions, as long as no one else is waiting. Children do not need a library card for access, but should be accompanied by an adult caregiver.
