Arnie Pritchard—"This Business of Fighting" Letters Home From His Father During WWII

Early in 1942, Tony Pritchard, a young man from Rhode Island, who had rarely been outside New England, went into the U.S. Army. By the time he returned home more than five years later, he had been all over the United States and Western Europe, had led



troops in combat, had nearly died, had worked with refugees, and in general had encountered a world far wider and far more brutal than anything he had known. In letters home, discovered after his death, his son Arnie Pritchard brings to life his father's experiences during this time in history. ETTY, a one act play performed by Susan Stein, based on the diaries and letters of Etty Hillesum 2:00 PM Sun., November 22



Set in Holland during WWII, this one-act play features Etty standing alone on a bare stage, speaking directly to the audience as she witnesses her world and confronts God with her ethical and moral questions. Crafted solely from Hillesum's

writings, this unconventional theater experience brings the audience into Etty's thinking, as she wrestles to write the life she is living--her loves, her work, her wry sense of humor, her knowledge of self and the moment in history. Each performance is followed by an audience-generated discussion that effectively becomes the second act of the play. This presentation is sponsored by the Library Foundation of Needham.

Meet a Pilgrim from Plimoth Plantation Tues., November 24th 4:00 PM

An Historic Interpreter will portray a resident of 1624 Plimoth Colony. Speaking with a regional, English dialect of the 17th century, wearing accurate reproduction clothing, and using repro-

duction artifacts, the interpreter will bring the world of Pilgrims to life. Beginning with the hiring of the Mayflower in England, the interpreter will bring the audience through the voyage, the first winter, and the first Thanksgiving in Plimoth. Dr. Gary Hylander—America in the Gilded Age Tues., November 24th 7:30 PM



The phrase "gilded age" was coined by Mark Twain to describe the years following the Civil War. Reconstruction came to an end and recently emancipated black Americans found them-

selves living in a Jim Crow South. The frontier disappeared and transcontinental railroads crisscrossed the land. Captains of Industry made great fortunes in oil, steel and coal, while waves of immigrants flooded into America's cities, toiling long hours in sweatshops, steel mills and factories. At the close of the century, differences with Spain resulted in "that splendid little war," a war that propelled the United States to a world power and gave the nation its first celebrity president, Theodore Roosevelt. This is the third of a four lecture series and is sponsored by the Library Foundation of Needham.



NPL Book Group Tuesday, November 10th Someone by Alice McDermott

Our first glimpse of Marie is as a child: a girl in glasses waiting on a Brooklyn stoop for her beloved father to come home from work. A seemingly innocuous encounter with a young woman named Pegeen

sets the bittersweet tone of this remarkable novel. She describes herself as an "amadan," a fool; indeed, soon after her chat with Marie, Pegeen tumbles down her own basement stairs. The magic of McDermott's novel lies in how it reveals us all as fools for this or that, in one way or another.

Marie's first heartbreak and her eventual marriage; her brother's brief stint as a Catholic priest, subsequent loss of faith and eventual breakdown; the Second World War; her parents' deaths; the births and lives of Marie's children; the changing world of her Irish-American enclave in Brooklyn—McDermott sketches all of it with sympathy and insight.. *December 8, 2015 Book—The Johnstown Flood by David McCullough*

Genius on the Edge: The Bizarre Double Life of Dr. William Stewart Halsted by Gerald Imber

Dr. William Stewart Halsted's life was fascinating and complex. Halsted, perhaps the most important surgeon America has ever produced, battled a lifelong cocaine addiction and maintained numerous secret relationships while simultaneously devising revolutionary medical innovations. Yet the story of Halsted's life, one of seemingly irreconcilable extremes, is in many ways the story of modern medicine. Before Halsted, poorlytrained doctors performed surgery without anesthesia in unsanitary conditions and patients were rarely expected to survive. Halstead transformed medical practice in numerous ways: inventing local and spinal anesthesia; introducing the use of rubber gloves during surgery; pioneering the use of fine silk thread for sutures; developing techniques for stabilizing blood pressure during surgery; and inventing the radical mastectomy, blood transfusions, and surgical cures for hernias. *December 16, 2015—Holidays on Ice by David Sedaris*
