

Bob Begin—The Rescue Of The Squalus Thurs., September 5th



On the morning of May 23, 1939, the new submarine Squalus, was preparing for a test dive off the coast of Portsmouth, New Hampshire. She was conducting final test dives prior to joining America's Navy as the

newest addition to the fleet. Aboard her were 56 Navy personnel—five officers, 51 enlisted men—and three civilians. Her Captain, Oliver Naquin expected this to be a routine dive with the Squalus returning to Portsmouth within a few hours. At 8:30 a.m. the order "Rig For Dive" was given, and the Squalus slipped below the surface. Within moments, what should have been a routine event turned into an out-of-control crisis as the boat started to sink rapidly by the stern. She would settle on the bottom, 243' below the surface, with several compartments flooded and only 33 known survivors. With no power, heat, communications, a limited

supply of breathable air, and the realization among the men, that, as of 1939, there had never been a successful rescue of men from



a stranded submarine, and they knew their situation was desperate. In spite of this, discipline was in place, and somehow, hope of rescue was strong.

Upon hearing that the Squalus was missing, a huge rescue attempt was launched. The Navy would summon all available resources to the scene. Among them was a dedicated submariner: "Swede" Momsen. He, more than any other individual, would be the key factor in the rescue. He had devoted his Navy career to devising techniques allowing men to escape safely from depths by using a breathing apparatus which would become known as the Momsen Lung. He also was one of the developers of the rescue bell that allowed men to be retrieved from depths considered impossible. The story of how the Squalus was found, the extensive number of dives prior to the rescue of the crew, the safe retrieval of 33 men, and her ultimate salvage from the bottom reflect courage, dedication, and lessons learned which would enable numerous future

This was a widely followed news event which took place in "our own backyard" and warrants retelling. Sponsored by the Library Foundation of Needham.


Teen/'Tween Movie: The Sun Is Also a Star (Rated PG-13, 100 minutes)

Summer Reading Program Wrap-up



This summer there were Summer Reading programs that covered the gamut, with all ages being served, and with all supported by program events. The Children's Dept. sponsored two programs—the Early Literacy Program for ages 1-4 and the Race in Outer Space program for rising K-5th Graders. Participants read for a total of 480,276 minutes this summer. Totals for the various programs were as follows:

Early Literacy-57 registrations and 39 participating readers (68%) and 18 completions (31%).

Race in Outer Space–895 signups, with 579 participating readers (64.5% participation) and 217 completes (24.5% completed). The highest school completion rate was for the Hillside/Williams elementary school.

For the second year in a row, the library sponsored a Young Adult Summer Reading Program for grades 6-12, with 53 signups and 24 participants. A total of 205 books were read, with prizes awarded each time a book entry was turned in. A drawing was held to award the grand prize of a Nintendo Gaming System and a Kindle Fire at the end of the summer. For the first time ever, the library had an Adult Summer Reading Program, with each participant given a certificate to one free book, courtesy of the Friends of the Needham Public Library's Ongoing Book Sale. Participants played Book Bingo, with the opportunity to enter drawings for gift certificates to local establishments for every bingo slip you turned in. There were 50 participants, with 9 different people who turned in raffle forms, 5 of whom turned in 5 completed forms filling out a full bingo board! There were 30 rows completed from different Bingo Boards. Grand prize was a \$50 gift certificate to Blue on Highland, won by former Library Trustee Lois Bacon.


One Book One Community Read October 2019

Author B. A. Shapiro will be coming to speak on Sunday, October 6, 2019, at 2:00 PM in the Community Room.

On Tuesday, October 22nd, at 7:00 PM, the library will show the documentary film *Stolen*. *Stolen* is a full exploration of the Gardner theft, and the fascinating, disparate characters involved: from the 19th century Grand dame Isabella Gardner to a private detective obsessed with finding the art to a terrorist organization with a penchant for stealing Vermeers. Other activities include a Paint Afternoon for Adults on Saturday, October 12th at 2:00 PM, and an Escape Room weekend for Young Adults on October 26th & 27th. Both of these events will require registration, which will begin closer to the event. Once again, the library will host book discussion groups, on Sunday, October 13th at 2:00 PM; Thursday, October 17th at 7:30 PM; and on Sunday, October 20th at 5:00 PM.



Things That Make White People Uncomfortable by Michael Bennett

Thurs., September 12th

An outspoken activist athlete practically dares readers to think of professional football and its players in the same way again after finishing this book. Michael Bennett is a Super Bowl Champion, a three-time Pro Bowl defensive end, a fearless activist, a feminist, a grassroots philanthropist, an organizer, and a change maker. He's also one of the most scathingly humorous athletes on the planet, and he wants to make you uncomfortable. Bennett adds his unmistakable voice to discussions of racism and police violence, Black athletes and their relationship to powerful institutions like the NCAA and the NFL, the role of protest in history, and the responsibilities of athletes as role models to speak out against injustice. Following in the footsteps of activist-athletes from Muhammad Ali to Colin Kaepernick, Bennett demonstrates his outspoken leadership both on and off the field. Greenland is the world's largest island and least densely popu-



Lorenz Finison — Stories from a Century of Boston's Cycling History

Needham author Larry Finison will present the importance of bicycling to Boston's culture for more than a century. His focus will be on a few hotspots, including Boston, Cambridge, Waltham, Newton—and Needham. Topics to be discussed include: racing, touring, commuting, bikeways, rails-to-trails, bike trains, bike building,

women's cycling, black and immigrant cyclists, and the Tour de Trump. He will discuss the famed (at the time) Dedham to Needham road race of the 1890s. Cycling slid into the shadows of the automobile, until it came back in the cycling Renaissance of the 1970s. Bicycle institutions like the Bicycle Repair Collective, the Bicycle Exchange, and the Boston Area Bicycle Coalition came to the fore. The conflicts over

uses of the roads and abandoned rail lines will show how bicycles fit, or didn't, into Boston's culture. A Needham resident, Finison is a social psychologist, public health practitioner, and historian. Books will be available for purchase at the conclusion of the talk. Rana Chudnofsky—The Relaxation Response Sun., October 20th 2:00 PM



In March of 1990, two thieves dressed as Boston police officers gained entrance to the Isabella Stewart Gardner museum in Boston Massachusetts and successfully executed the largest art heist in modern history. Among the thirteen priceless works stolen was Vermeer's

"The Concert" one of only 35 of the masters surviving works. Not a single one of the works has been recovered. STOLEN is a full exploration of the Gardner theft, and the fascinating, disparate characters involved: from the 19th century Grand dame Isabella Gardner to a private detective obsessed with finding the art to a terrorist organization with a penchant for stealing Vermeers.
